Proposal:	The premises is a public house located in the town centre. The application is to vary the authorised plans attached to the licence All licensable activities and authorised hours to remain unaltered.	

### 1. <u>SITE LOCATION</u>

1.1 The premises is a public house situated in the town centre. There are mainly commercial properties in the vicinity but there are some residential properties. A site location map is attached as **Appendix 1**. The dots on the map indicate residential properties.

### 2. <u>LICENCE HISTORY</u>

- 2.1 The current premises licence GUPLA0436 and the authorised plans are attached as **Appendix 2**.
- 2.2 The licence commenced on 7 September 2009, and was transferred to the current licence holder on 1 August 2013.
- 2.3 The designated premises supervisor (DPS) has been varied once since the licence was first granted. The current DPS has been named on the licence since 1 August 2013.
- 2.4 An application to vary the licence was made in 2013 to update the authorised plans, and this variation was granted without representations on 3 January 2014.

### 3. APPLICATION

The application form, a copy of which is attached as **Appendix 3**, gives the following information in relation to the variation proposal.

### 3.1 Proposed hours:

There is no change to the proposed hours.

#### 3.2 Conditions

- 3.2.1 The applicant has proposed steps to promote the licensing objectives in section 16 of the application form. We have tried to convert these into appropriate, enforceable conditions.
  - 1. The licence holder shall ensure that the smoking area marked in red on the accompanying plan number 07/33 of the premises:
    - a. is roped off after 20:00 hours to contain smokers
    - b. is cleared of customers by 23:30 hours Sunday to Thursday, and 02:00 hours Friday and Saturday
    - c. is monitored by a SIA registered door supervisor from 22:30 hours until the area is cleared, and the door supervisor shall ensure patrons in the smoking area keep the noise down to prevent disturbance to local residents
    - d. is limited to a maximum of 20 customers at any one time
    - e. is cleaned and reset after the area is cleared
  - 2. The licence holder shall ensure that patrons use the smoking area on the first floor after 23:30 hours Sunday to Thursday and after 02:00 hours Friday and Saturday. This area shall be monitored by a SIA registered door supervisor and limited to 20 patrons.

### 3.3 Authorised Plan

The proposal is to allow patrons to take beverages into the small paved area outlined in red on the attached plan (number 07/33), which is to be roped off to contain smokers during the evening after 8 pm, with the area being closed to patrons from 11.30 pm Sunday to Thursday and 2.00 am on Friday and Saturday. There have also been some minor internal changes to the building, including the reduction of the bar area in the Tudor Lounge end of the premises allowing patrons to access the bay window.

### 4. CONSULTATIONS

### (i) Consultation period

The application was originally in consultation from 27<sup>th</sup> November to 24 December 2014. The application was not advertised in accordance with the regulations, and as a result, the consultation period was restarted, following correspondence with the applicant, on 9 February 2015, ending on 8 March 2015. Any representations received after 27<sup>th</sup> November 2014 and before 9 February 2015 were carried forward.

### (ii) Representations from Responsible Authorities

None. A representation was received from Environmental Health (Pollution Control) however the representation was withdrawn following mediation.

The environmental health officer stated:

Mr Croxford has installed and set a tamperproof Formula Sound AVC2 noise controller, to regulate amplified music and speech on the premise. Tests indicate the noise controller is functioning and regulating noise breakout from the venue to a level that will not cause noise nuisance to residents in the locality.

The applicant has also acknowledged and included measures for the management of clientele to control any excess patron noise outside the bar. Therefore my concerns on the proposed variation on noise grounds have been addressed.

### (iii) Representations from other persons

Two representations received from the Holy Trinity Amenity Group and a local resident, mainly on the grounds of prevention of public nuisance, although the former refers to all four licensing objectives. A copy of these representations are attached as **Appendix 4.**

#### **MANDATORY CONDITIONS**

#### A: Sales of alcohol

- No supply of alcohol may be made under the premises licence
  - a. at a time when there is no designated premises supervisor in respect of the premises licence, or
  - b. at a time when the designated premises supervisor does not hold a personal licence or the personal licence is suspended
- 2. Every supply of alcohol under the premises licence must be made or authorised by a person who holds a personal licence

### **Mandatory Licensing Conditions (Alcohol Sales)**

- 1.1 The responsible person shall take all reasonable steps to ensure that staff on relevant premises do not carry out, arrange or participate in any irresponsible promotions in relation to the premises.
- 1.2 In this paragraph, an irresponsible promotion means any one or more of the following activities, or substantially similar activities, carried on for the purpose of encouraging the sale or supply of alcohol for consumption on the premises in a manner which carries a significant risk of leading or contributing to crime and disorder, prejudice to public safety, public nuisance, or harm to children
  - a. games or other activities which require or encourage, or are designed to require or encourage, individuals to-
    - i. drink a quantity of alcohol within a time limit (other than to drink alcohol sold or supplied on the premises before the cessation of the period in which the responsible person is authorised to sell or supply alcohol), or
    - ii.drink as much alcohol as possible (whether within a time limit or otherwise);
  - b. provision of unlimited or unspecified quantities of alcohol free or for a fixed or discounted fee to the public or to a group defined by a particular characteristic (other than any promotion or discount available to an individual in respect of alcohol for consumption at a table meal, as defined in section 159 of the Act);
  - c. provision of free or discounted alcohol or any other thing as a prize to encourage or reward the purchase and consumption of alcohol over a period of 24 hours or less;
  - d. provision of free or discounted alcohol in relation to the viewing on the premises of a sporting event, where that provision is dependent on
    - i. the outcome of a race, competition or other event or process, or
    - ii. the likelihood of anything occurring or not occurring;
  - e. selling or supplying alcohol in association with promotional posters or flyers on, or in the vicinity of, the premises, which can reasonably be considered to condone, encourage or glamorise anti-social behaviour or to refer to the effects of drunkenness in any favourable manner.
- 2. The responsible person shall ensure that no alcohol is dispensed directly by one person into the mouth of another (other than where that other person is unable to drink without assistance by reason of a disability).
- 3. The responsible person shall ensure that free tap water is provided on request to customers where it is reasonably available.
- 4.1 The premises licence holder or club premises certificate holder shall ensure that an age verification policy applies to the premises in relation to the sale or supply of alcohol.
- 4.2 The policy must require individuals who appear to the responsible person to be under 18 years of age (or such older age as may be specified in the policy) to produce on request, before being served alcohol, identification bearing their photograph, date of birth and a holographic mark.

- The responsible person shall ensure that
  - a. where any of the following alcoholic drinks is sold or supplied for consumption on the premises (other than alcoholic drinks sold or supplied having been made up in advance ready for sale or supply in a securely closed container) it is available to customers in the following measures
    - i. beer or cider: 1/2 pint;
    - ii. gin, rum, vodka or whisky: 25 ml or 35 ml; and
    - iii.still wine in a glass: 125 ml; and
  - b. customers are made aware of the availability of these measures.

### **B: Film exhibitions**

- a) Subject to subsection (b) below, the admission of children to the exhibition of films on the premises shall be restricted in accordance with any recommendation made by the British Board of Film Classification (BBFC)
- b) If the licensing authority does not agree with the category of any film as recommended by the BBFC, it may alter the category of the film. On notice of alteration of category being given by the licensing authority to the holder of the licence, the film shall thereafter be treated as being in the altered category and admission of children to the exhibition of the film shall be restricted accordingly

### C: Door supervision

Where at specified times one or more individuals must be at the premises to carry out a security activity, all such individuals must be licensed by the 'Security Industry Authority (SIA)

### D: Permitted hours

### As displayed on the Premises Licence

Variations from these times:

10 events a year till 04:30 with 14 days notice to the Police and the Licensing Authority.

On all Bank Holiday Sundays all licensable activities shall continue until 3am the following morning.

New Years Eve: 10:00am till 06:00am the next day (All Licensable Activities except Hours premises are open to the public which will be 06:30am the next day)

### E: Further conditions agreed with Environmental Health 01 September 2009

- 1. A tamper proof noise-limiting device shall be installed and permanently maintained in good working order within the premises. The device shall automatically control the volume of all amplified live and recorded entertainment at the venue at all times, such that noise will not cause disturbance to the locality or any adjacent noise sensitive premises. The maximum volume played shall be set in arrangement with officers of the Environmental Health & Licensing Division, which shall not be exceeded. If necessary, the licensee shall arrange to reset this level upon request from officers of the Division.
- 2. All regulated entertainment, to which the licence applies, shall be restricted to within the buildings of the premises. No loudspeakers providing amplified music shall be installed or allowed to be broadcast to any external part of the building.
- 3. External entry and exit doors and windows serving the licensed area shall be kept shut at all times when regulated entertainment is being provided. Doors may be opened for normal entrance and egress of people, but must be shut immediately thereafter to prevent breakout of speech and amplified music. To provide an unrestricted thoroughfare, the connecting doors serving the external dining and drinking area linking the two parts of the venue (currently known as Fahrenheit 55 and the Tudor Lounge) are exempt from this requirement. Noise from the closing of doors shall not be audible beyond the site boundary.

#### F: Additional conditions as laid out in the application operating schedule dated 15 July 2009

- 1. All glasses to be used on the premises shall be made of toughened glass and no glass bottles will be permitted to be taken off the premises at any time.
- 2. No timed drinks promotions shall be used as this could promote binge drinking.
- 3. The DPS of the premise shall be active member of Pubwatch.
- 4. The seating capacity of this premise shall not be reduced in the evening.
- 5. Staff training shall include how to spot and resolve potential incidents, including an awareness of the signs of illegal activities.
- 6. 24 hr digital CCTV system comprising 6 cameras, 4 interior and 2 exterior minimum.
- 7. Use of door staff to restrict customer numbers to a safe level.
- 8. Staff are trained to be vigilant towards drug related use within the premises including "Date-Rape" drugs.
- 9. Staff shall be trained in the emergency evacuation procedures.
- 10. Recommendations from Surrey fire and rescue will be adhered to.
- 11. The front door of the premises shall be kept closed to minimise noise pollution.
- 12. No music shall be playing during drinking up time, so patron's volume of speech shall hopefully be reset to normal level.
- 13. Taxis available upon request.
- 14. Children must be accompanied by adults during the day.
- 15. Only patrons over the age of 18 shall be permitted in the bar area.
- 16. The only forms of I.D which shall be accepted as proof of age are either a DVLA driver licence or a passport.
- 17. No under 18's to be allowed in the venue after 20:00
- 18. Signs shall be displayed requesting customers to leave quietly to help prevent public nuisance.
- 19. The cigarette machine shall be located in a part of the premises not open during the day.
- 20. All staff shall be trained to operate a challenge 21 policy.
- 21. No external advertising shall be used which could cause offence or could encourage under 18's to drink alcohol.
- 22. SIA registered door staff shall monitor internal and external areas of the premises to curtail any behaviour which would cause a public nuisance, this is to include the High Street at closing time as patrons leave the premises.
- 23. At the end of each evening a member of staff shall sweep the passage way leading to the High Street to ensure any rubbish is cleared away.





The area will be cleared by 11.30pm Sunday-Thursday and 2am Friday and Saturday. Patrons wishing to smoke after this area is shut will be directed to the small outside area on the first floor to the front of the building, again patrolled by a security supervisor and limited to 20 people.

### e) The protection of children from harm

No changes to activities or hours. Existing conditions will remain. By containing the smokers in one area children passing by are more likely to be able to avoid coming into contact with second hand smoke.







## Objection to Premises License Variation Application 158567 Fahrenheit 55, 3 Milkhouse Gate, Guildford GU1 3EZ

### The application is:

"To allow patrons to take beverages into the smoking area in the interests of safety/prevention of crime as a result of drinks left unguarded. A small paved area .....to the rear of the building is roped off to contain smokers during evenings only post 8pm when adjacent shops are shut. No changes to licensable activities or hours. This area will close 11.30pm Sunday-Thursday and 2am Friday and Saturday."

## We object to this application.

### Context.

The premises are situated in the middle of the shopping area, on the narrow Milkhouse Gate, just off the High Street. Milkhouse Gate contains various shops, and also the busy rear entrance to Sainsbury. This part of the Gate is designated a secondary shopping area, and is not suitable for activities associated with the night-time economy; it is also close to residential areas. It is an important and much used pedestrian route, being a designated footpath, FP74, and also a Town Path, T7041. Milkhouse Gate is one of the listed town centre streets where neither drinking, nor street trading are allowed.

The applicant does not own the land on which this enclosure is proposed, nor that which has been previously annexed and on which a permanent structure now sits. No records have been found to legally establish ownership. However these areas have been open to the public for a very long time, and probably formed part of the original "Gate". The whole street surface has also been maintained and renewed jointly by our two councils; work on it has included environmental improvements, such as the planter that would be within the proposed enclosure. Both areas must be considered as part of the Milkhouse Gate street. Even if there are no records to prove this, the areas in question have become part of the street by virtue of public use over many years. This is confirmed in the letter of 5<sup>th</sup> March 2008 from James Taylor of SCC to Ms Williams of GBC.

It remains our view that planning approval for the existing covered enclosure was wrongly given, and also that it should not be operating without a Highways License.

We are uncertain whether the premises license (for drinking ON the premises only) was ever varied to allow for the addition of this area.

The applicant already closes off the proposed extra area, without permission, and people have been observed drinking in it. This was the subject of a complaint to the police.

There is no need for this smoking facility. The establishment already have one on the first floor, and if necessary the existing outdoor extension could be opened up more to meet the regulations and to serve as a smoking area.

Considering the specific criteria to be considered:

### 1. The prevention of crime and disorder.

This area is part of a street in which drinking is not allowed. It would therefore be illegal to encourage this to happen. The barriers being used both for the approved extension and for the additional unapproved one, are only about a metre high and it is easy to step over them. At times when the Club is busy this will just encourage clients to step over, and perhaps take their drinks to the comparatively close streets where drinking is not prohibited. This will severely compromise the security of the operation, as persons can enter or leave the establishment without being checked. It is also easy for items to be passed either way over the barriers to anyone outside, in particular there would be nothing to stop drinks being passed over the barriers to somebody excluded from entry.

This might seem a small area to be of any concern, but if annexation of public street space is allowed here for drinking, then the whole strategy of constraining street drinking in Guildford, and preventing associated crime and disorder, would be undermined. A dangerous precedent would be set.

### 2. Public safety.

The pedestrian route can be busy, even in the evening especially when events are happening in the town centre. By considerably narrowing the route and causing congestion there is the risk of falls, and of thefts. The street must also be open enough to function as a fire escape route from a number of premises in the Gate.

By being forced into such close proximity to smokers, in a small enclosed area, there is the risk of passers by inhaling smoke.

There is a real risk of glasses falling outside of the barrier onto the pedestrian route. The annexation of a further part of the public area would represent another expansion of the active business area, which is already too large in relation to its cramped access provision.

### 3. The prevention of public nuisance.

The narrow part of the pedestrian route is already sometimes blocked by clients and security staff standing outside the entrance. Noise would be a nuisance to passersby, and to some nearby residents. The operation would generally degrade the environment of this area.

### 4. The protection of children from harm.

There could be increased risk to passing children from the hazards outlined above.
